President's Piece

Well here goes, my first article in my new role as President and an opportunity to give you some background, as to who I am and how I am now, in this prestigious position.

When Duncan Greenhalgh asked me to take on the role of Vice President and then to move on to be President I was both honoured to be asked, but conscious that I didn't want to agree without giving some

serious thought to what the 'job' entailed. For those of you who know me on the racing circuit, I am generally a back of the fleet sailor. However, this hasn't deterred me from enjoying the racing both at my home club of Derwent Reservoir and on the circuit. In fact I have never missed a national or world championship since first taking part at Abersoch in 2003, where I crewed for Maurice Cooper.

During the past 13 years I have had fun, meeting some great people and have sailed with lots of crews, but several events will always come to mind. Sligo, the Irish hospitality and Andrea Thomson and I staying upright on 20 feet high waves. Then sailing in Mounts Bay, again with Andrea, in the most extreme conditions (like being in a washing machine was how Richard Estaugh described the day) and coming off the water exhausted, but given cake from Mark Collingwood. The highlight, when, with Duncan Greenhalgh crewing in the World Championships in Sri Lanka, we rounded the first mark, in the first race, in second place. We then went on to sail in third place right until the last reach leg to the finish, where sadly we lost out, as our spinnaker knot came undone. Sri Lanka holds a special place in my heart, not only because I won the female helm trophy, but because it lived up to all my expectations, due to the tremendous work of Duncan Fraser and his team.

People working together, both on and off the water, produce superb championships. Strangford Loch, (where I had fun sailing with Tom Daniels) and of course Barbados this year (where Clare Patton and I 'cruised raced') have both been memorable. Credit must go to our Championship Team, led by Gill Beddow. It is people like Gill who put tremendous time and effort into ensuring our Class continues to be acknowledged on the world stage. As a direct result of our World Championship this year, organised by Andrew Davies, we welcome the Barbados sailors and a new international branch to our

Association. It is this international growth which continues to support our position when it comes to world championships and complying with ISAF rules.

However, we mustn't lose sight of our 'grass roots' membership. It is with this in mind that I have once again revamped the Fleet Captain's Manual, which still contains relevant information to help our continued growth. The manual, as the title suggests is targeted at fleet captains, but the message is for everyone, who like me, cares about the great dinghy that we sail. All the fleet captains and area representatives will be sent a copy, with a copy available in our member's section. It gives helpful tips, ideas and information. Perhaps a little 'wordy', but It offers suggestions, aimed specifically at promoting and developing the GP14 Fleet and still worth a look.

As a GP14 sailor who is actively engaged on the racing and cruising circuit, you are aware of the camaraderie which exists at events and the work that goes into maintaining the GP14 profile. I believe that the GP14 is still, even after over 60 years, a boat worth promoting, as it meets the needs of such a range of sailors and as an Association our diverse membership is to be cherished. I want to build on bringing in a new generation of sailors, capturing our youth market, whilst rejuvenating clubs where a GP14 sailor's enthusiasm has perhaps waned. We are a vibrant and caring Class. I want to extend that sense of belonging, so everyone involved with GP14 sailing, wants to be a member of the Association. If you are a Fleet Captain, your help and support are often the major contributory factors to the success of an active Fleet and also you are ideally placed to promote Association membership. Through your help the Class can grow and keep its place as a truly international classic dinghy, which not only meets the needs of leisure or family sailors but also the competitive racer.

The GP14 Association exists to help and support members in their club activities, and also at regional, national and international level. As a member, use your Fleet Captain to keep in contact with your local Area Representative, as they are your spokesperson on the General Committee and disseminate information and support material to you. If you are a member of the Association, but not a club, or your club doesn't have a GP14 Fleet Captain, your opinion is still valued. The Association is there to meet the needs of ALL our membership.

Like Duncan and my predecessors, I care passionately about the GP14. My sailing experience and technical knowledge, may fall short of the presidents who have gone before me, but what I have is the capacity to gather an effective team and to listen to the members. My team have a wealth of knowledge and expertise, however there is still a need for a webmaster. Hugh Brazier has done sterling work and will continue along

with Stuart Elder with archive material. Julie Courtney and Michelle Evans continue to post regularly on the website, but if you can help, please get in touch.

At the black tie dinner in Windermere for the 'End of Seasons', which is also the start of the Super Eight Series, I stood up and looked around the room. Don't let anyone tell you that young people don't sail GP's! A super social evening, where the camaraderie of the GP14 Class had pulled in a full entry. Thank you to Ellie Devereux and Hayley Ramadhar for volunteering to represent the youth views and take an active part on the Committee. This was a great 'final' weekend's sailing in a beautiful location. Congratulations to Shane MacCarthy and Andy Thompson, who finally won, but had some stiff competition, from Nick Devereux with Sam Platt, who were second and a very special mention to Megan Hicklin, with Hayley Ramadhar who took the third place. Me, well I was counting from the back, but still had some great racing with Graham Fraser crewing. That's the thing about the Class there is racing throughout the Fleet, whether you be gold, silver or bronze. Alternatively don't race, but come along and enjoy cruising in company with others.

Good luck to you guys who will continue to race in the various winter series. Hopefully I'll see you racers and cruisers on the circuit. Or look out for me visiting your club in my little campervan.

As always a BIG thank you to all our sponsors, especially Craftinsure, for your continued support for the Grand Prix Series and Exe Sails, who will once again, next year donate a genoa to be raffled at the RYA Dinghy Show.

Before I sign off, I want to thank Duncan who has been actively involved with promoting the GP14, first as the Scottish Representative and latterly during his time as President, where he has worked tirelessly to continue to develop the Class. He is certainly a well deserving recipient of the gold president's badge, which I had the pleasure to bestow upon him and I am sure he will enjoy the bottle of Jura malt (he likes a drink or two). He will be a hard act to follow. So thank you once again for being a super President, in what has been a tremendous year where the GP14 really went global.

Treasurer Talk

Finance Matters

At the time of writing we are in process of finalising the GP14 Association accounts for the year ended 30th September 2016 and thinking about spending plans for next season. In the year just finished I am confident we will be close to our budget prediction of a

small deficit of £2000, with maybe a small surplus. This is an acceptable financial performance against a back drop of falling membership income because our total membership numbers continue to fall. Our single biggest challenge as a class association is to stem the nett loss of members we have seen in recent years and it becomes harder each year to balance the books without reducing the level of service to the membership. Our other income streams have held up well, and I believe our cost control is strong in managing our overheads. Our balance sheet remains strong and we continue to develop ideas to improve the membership benefits.

In the coming year, we intend to support training for youth sailors in both mainland UK and Ireland, hold adult training sessions, continue with an active Championship Series, the GP14 Super 8 and continue to develop ideas to engage and encourage club sailors in local fleets. Our web-site, Mainsail, and the monthly e-newsletter will continue to be the main communications to Association members and we encourage all members to use these and contribute too. Our office is open 9-5 Monday to Friday, for all matters GP14

In our last meeting with Craftinsure, who manage the GP14 Class Association Insurance Scheme, we were encouraged to remind members to review the value of their GP14 before renewal. The market value of your boat is what would be paid out in the situation of a total loss, and it is possible some members haven't reviewed the market value of older boats to realistic current values. It could save you some money with your renewal premium too. The Insurance Scheme is a great asset to the class and Crafinsure are a strong supporter of GP14 sailing, so

please give them a call on 03452 607888 before renewal if you currently insure your boat elsewhere.

GP14 Website

It's now about 9 months since we re-vamped the web site to improve the layout, performance and content of the site. There is now superb video content and current event photos to have a look at. We also try to ensure news content is current and relevant to encourage regular visits. There have been many complimentary remarks; however we are sure that we could do more to promote our class and the GP14. JOE MARTIN



The GP14 Class was saddened to hear of the recent passing of Joe Martin Hon. Treasurer and Secretary of the Irish Association between 1988 and 2001.

Joe first got involved with the GP14 class when he purchased 'Vol-e-vent' for son Paul and friend David Mc Williams in the 1970's helping Paul to strip and repaint the boat

from bare timbers.

In the 80's Joe got involved with the Irish Association at the request of Peter Hannon of Blessington Sailing Club. It was the start of a long and distinguished period serving on the Irish Association Committee. From 1988 to 1997 Joe held the positions of Hon. Treasurer and Hon. Secretary simultaneously, retaining the position of Treasurer from 1997 to 2001 and thus helping to build the Irish fleet through its peak period. Joe had a reputation as a fantastic administrator and would arrive to all the events with his big black book for tracking the race winners and trophies. Pouncing immediately after the prize giving, the lucky

winner had to sign immediately for the awarded trophies and woe betide anyone who forgot to bring their trophies back the following year! A quick look at the details in the Handbooks during this period will show that every competitors name is diligently recorded along with name of the association trophy they won.

Daughter Anne had been a GP crew for many years and when Paul emigrated to Australia she took the helm of Free Energy campaigning the boat on the circuit and enjoying many hours on Dublin bay with Joe during his retirement. From son-in-law and GP14 sailor Will Moody: "I met Joe in 1988 at a GP14 committee meeting in Crewe. It was not until 1997 I met my wife Anne, Joe kept her a secret. I am sure there are many within the GP14 fleet who will miss his wise words and incredible intellect."

Sadly, Joan passed away in 2015 while Joe was battling his illness.

Bob died this year after a long fight with cancer. He was a former member of Bassenthwaite SC before moving abroad to work. He was a keen and active sailor in the 1980s, sailing GP14 'Boo' with his wife Helen at their club and on the GP circuit.

Much feared by all the racers and an integral part of this year's story, weed dominated talk of the changeover area for the first few hours. Anyone with a fixed rudder would have been cursing the gods and spending as much time bent over the side clearing it as in the boat sailing it. That said it's a situation many of us pond sailors are used to battling on an annual basis so there was no excuse for not adapting to conditions.

If weed clearing was the first lesson to learn, the second was don't make Mike Senior any promises when you're drunk! Over a rum punch or ten in Barbados Mike apparently challenged the tipsy Neil Marsden to turn up for this year's event, to which he agreed. Just to make sure, Mike recorded the evidence on his phone and didn't let him forget his

promise. After the start it looked like something Mike would regret with the Marsden helmed Blackpool & Fleetwood boat making the best start to take the lead from the South Staffs GP14 boat. Budworth (A) GP14 and Bolton (A) GP14 rounded out the top five (with a stray South Staffs Lark sandwiched in third).

The first couple of hours saw the top three start to ease away with Budworth falling foul of the weed and Bolton, hitting a mark and temporarily unable to lift the rudder, booted down to 27th.

It's the strength and depth of the South Staffs team that has given them the advantage in recent years with this year no exception. Many rival teams would have breathed a sigh of relief as they saw Mike Senior and Ollie Goodhead coming off the water mid-afternoon, only to regret that as current OK World Champion Jim Hunt and Liz Senior took over. With the team also featuring Andy Hateley, Dave Young, Ross Kearney and Haley Ramadhar there were no weak links and the team showed their dominance, after getting past Blackpool they only lost the first position briefly to their Lark team in the night.

Off the water Budworth SC celebrated their 70th birthday with free Pimms for all. On the water at the time happy hour started I was relieved to be allowed to 'catch up' by Hugh Devereux and gladly supped up. I was amazed there was any left after seeing very chilled Championship Chair Gill Beddow with a glass in both hands and a waiting white wine being looked after by Chris.

As the sun set on Saturday the wind dropped and the GP14 teams were wondering if they needed to take a hip flask and crossword puzzle out for the night shifts to keep them awake during the float. Having happily swapped my



4am shift for the comfort of my tent I drifted off to shouts of starboard and was assured in the morning that it was cold, windless and most certainly not fun.

With sunrise came new hope that the forecast was wrong and there would be enough wind to allow at least some sitting on the side for the crumpled crews who had spent the night stuffed in the front like an old receipt in your wallet. The wind came and the racing picked up from 6ish until about 11am when it just died completely, the sunshine however never left us so it wasn't all bad!

With the finish in sight it was only South Staffs who could realistically beat South Staffs. They may be one Club but the Lark and GP14 teams had a rivalry more akin to Lewis Hamilton and Nico Rosberg as soon as the cannons started firing.

After the win Mike Senior commented "It was very competitive this year. All the usual teams were there but given it was a special year there were more than in recent times. It meant a lot to win, not only because it was the 50th year, but because it was our fourth time in a row and second successive year finishing first and second which I don't think has been done before."

Apart from the win it was the Class that also managed to get 12 boats in the top 20 with eight from the North and four from the Midlands.

International GP14 President Ann Penny speaking after the win said: "It was great to see a GP14 winning the prestigious 24 Hour Race and especially in this the fiftieth anniversary year. Thirty two entries from the Class is fantastic, congratulations to South Staffs Sailing Club (the B Team) on their success and well done to all the other clubs who raced a GP14. Thank you to West Lancashire Yacht Club for once again hosting a super event.

Update of Class Rules

GP Fourteen Class International Association (1974)

The latest revision of the GP14 Class Rules has been published (September 2016) and is available on the Class web site. Mainly this has been a tidying up exercise since the last revision in 2012.

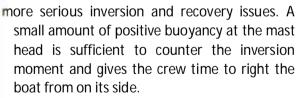
Specifically a safety enhancement has been added by allowing the use of a flotation panel at the head of the mainsail to be used whilst racing.

Over several years since the double bottom GP hull has been around, the layout and volume of the buoyancy tanks has been progressively modified with two objectives;

- Firstly to reduce the height of the centreboard above the water level in a capsized boat when horizontal to help the boat's crew climb on the board and right the boat,
- Secondly to attempt to reduce the inversion moment after capsizing produced by the weight of the mast and the buoyancy in the floor tank either side of the centre of gravity, which results in an inverted hull.

Tank layout modifications have improved the floating height of the board when the hull is horizontal but have largely failed to slow the rate of inversion. Trials have been made with mast head floats and lessons learned from other, more

modern dinghy classes with less freeboard and



GPs used for training often use mast head floats. These are effective but not aerodynamic and seen by racing competitors as a disadvantage. The alternative, to add buoyancy to the top of the mainsail, can be achieved by an



additional layer of sailcloth, much as an overlarge batten pocket, near the head of the sail into which a buoyancy panel can be slotted and tied in. These are effective and reasonably aerodynamic.

The rule change permits the use of these floats whilst racing and their use as an option in anticipation that competitors may use a float in certain conditions but not in others.

Further information from the trials and from members who have started to use these floats regarding size/materials etc. will be updated on the web site.

Sixteen enthusiastic sailors rolled up to Skerries Sailing Club Thursday 25th & Friday 26th of August 2016 for some training ahead of the GP14 Nationals. The Coach, Thomas Chaix made introductions, boats were set up, and with a light breeze not forecasted until the afternoon at best, it was decided to start off with some theory for the morning. The start line (no better place to start!) was discussed in detail together with 1st beat tactics.

After lunch, luckily a light breeze kicked in and we got to go out and practice some starts, beats and boat handling under the careful watch of Thomas. The wind was ideal for the 1st day of training so some could get used to GP14s, borrowed boats or new crews.

A few races ended the day, Edie & Emma from Blessington showed the boys up by pipping them on the finish line on first race. Loud and ecstatic with their performance they retired early to head to Dun Laoghaire to welcome home Olympic Medallist Annalise Murphy. After a few more races, we wrapped it up for the day.



The next day the wind was up and after more theory we hit the water. Things were a lot less forgiving than the previous day with almost everyone capsizing (a few times) until they started to get the hang of it. Some seemed to be enjoying capsizing a bit too much!

A lot of experience was gained during the session, with everyone's boat control improving vastly and some very fast

spinnaker reaches. After a break for lunch and with the wind not as strong as the morning we hit the water for one more short session.

After a number of practice races we finished early to take some time to relax and recuperate (for the weekends Nationals) after a hard day on the water!

Thanks to the ISA, Exe Sails and the Howard Davis Memorial GP14 youth fund for their contribution in funding the training event. The use of Skerries Sailing Club facilities was greatly appreciated also. And to Coach Thomas Chaix for sharing his expertise. It would not happen without some volunteers, so massive thanks to Helen Ryan from SSC on rescue and sandwiches, my wife Brid for more sandwiches and not to forget the campsite security guard, baby Dylan who made sure our back garden didn't turn into a festival!

Many of the participants raced into the weekend for the Nationals. Well done to Adrian Lee & Edward Coyne from Youghal Sailing Club who put in a great performance and finished only a few points off the top 10 in a very competitive fleet. Great fun was had by all.

GP14 Worlds Summary



Bumper entry for the Barbados Worlds

The 2016 GP14 World Championships certainly captured the imagination of both regular GP14 sailors and those from other fleets with over 100 boats from 11 different countries participating.

Gus Reader, President of the Barbados Sailing Association, was also stunned by the numbers: "With 104 entries, the GP14 World Championships is the largest sailing event we have held in Barbados, and this means 208 competitors, 186 support personnel and officials, which brings it to a total of over 400 visitors to Barbados."

The location was undoubtedly a factor in selling the event but the quality of the Gold Fleet was also another factor in raising the profile in the sailing community, tempting those from other fleets to join the showcase event, including Nick Craig. Going into the event though it was Ian Dobson and Andy Tunnicliffe (RWYC/Burwain) who were the pre-event favourites according to the sweepstake.

Launching was the trickiest thing the competitors had to cope with on Day 1 and after some of the practice attempts had put a few off 86 boats out of the registered 105 took to the water for the first day. With a sailing area that allowed for good views from the yacht club, and 28 degrees in the shade of the spinnaker, it was a day of champagne sailing and sunburn. Matt Burge and Paul Childs from Poole YC built a commanding lead by the end of the first lap with the current World Champions Dobson and Tunnicliffe coming in second.

Day 2 greeted the fleet with sunshine and lower waves on entry which encouraged more out. The first start of the day (Race 2) was abandoned due to either the motor on the outboard failing or the pathfinder setting off too soon depending on who you spoke to. The wind strength was variable throughout the day with the first beat challenging. The first reach was survival mode even for gold fleet with Andy Hateley and Ben Pickering (SSSC) capsizing from second place. For those not flying the spinnaker you could still plane down the reach just on the gib.

Between the spray and capsizes there were a lot of soggy sailors by the end of the race with Dobson/Tunnicliffe winning out followed by Craig/Lewis in second and MacCarthy/Davis (Greystones) third.

Sam Watson and Andy Thompson (Nantwich/East Antrim) who had a good Day 1 left the bung out but still managed to finish 15th in the second race before the slowly sinking boat crossed in 25th for the third race. With the wind dropping, Race 3 was a more tactical affair with the shifts on the beat once again proving vital and giving us our third different winner in as many races in Richard Instone and Jim Toothill (Blithfield SC). Bajan sailors Jason Tindale and Robert Povey found their feet in the fleet and managed to put in a 10th and 17th which, given their 3 weeks of GP14 sailing was impressive.

Day 3 of the 2016 GP14 World Championships was a day for creating tales of disaster or triumph that will be passed on from generation to generation!

As is the usual way getting a general consensus from the boat park as to the wind strength is like trying to get the real size of your catch of the day. Suffice it to say it was windy! I'll go with Force 6 gusting Force 7 but don't hold me to that. With the swell, the shifts and the gusts there was a lot going on and probably the most capsizes I've seen in one day, although I wasn't at the now infamous Strangford Loch Worlds.

The first beat of Race 4 was hard work! The gusts were coming through were relentless and the hiking hard but in race mode the fleet were all still pushing for a good position round the windward mark. Then came the decision about whether to pop the kite or not. There were great gains to be made if you did with some taking 25 places by doing so but then you had to be able to keep the boat upright if you did.

The rest of the race was hard attritional sailing that saw off many boats through breakages. The rudder of Burge/Childs came off at one point dumping them from the lead and back 10 places, Dobson/Tunnicliffe suffered worse though when their rudder broke. They headed back in to get a new one but by the time they got back out to the fleet the second race of the day had been cancelled.

There were some that really profited from the conditions and it gave Mike Senior and Chris White (SSSC) a boost with the win and moving them to 2nd overall. Craig/Lewis started to show their class and move into 1st overall. Gary Deighan and Dale Knowles from Bolton SC also enjoyed the heavier conditions of the past

couple of days bringing them up to 9th overall. Race 4 gave top 10 places to some who have been out of competitive racing for a while with former GP14 Youth Champion Andy Hateley and Ben Pickering (SSSC) getting an 8th and Shustoke SC sailor Steve Bennett, sailing with son Jack, getting 7th.

Day 4 started with an air of trepidation in the boat park. With many suffering from PTSD (post traumatic sailing disorder) after Day 3's force 7 gusts only the top ten were rigging the boats first thing. For the rest of us we were staring nervously around at each other playing boat-rigging chicken.

A rumour went round at one point that the conditions were worse than yesterday and there would be no racing. This wasn't true in the end but did put a good 20 boats off going out for the first race. It was a return to the top for Dobson/Tunnicliffe with the win, followed by the ever consistent MacCarthy/Davis and Watson/Thompson getting their best result in 3rd.

Race 6 was a steady force 4/5 mostly with 2 metre waves to the east of the committee boat and Craig/Lewis got their first win of the Championships. By this point there had been 6 different winners in 6 races and the top 4 separated only by 4 points creating a fantastically competitive event.

With a lighter forecast and blazing sunshine everyone was up for Day 5. Race 7 got away without incident and wind stayed fairly light, force 3/4 but very shifty, if you weren't careful you just found yourself stopped dead in a pocket of nothing.

From our back of the fleet vantage point I could see MacCarthy/Davis were in the lead on the first reach followed by Graham Flynn and Adam Froggatt (Chase SC) and Mark Taylor and Andrew Clewer (Poole YC) and that is where they finished.

At this stage I think it's worth mentioning the starts! In general I've never been as confused by the starts as at this event. Race 8 was the most chaotic start ever though, a massive shift on the line saw pathfinder Paul Owen and Sam Pickering (SSSC) sent ploughing through the middle of the lined up fleet. With half the right side of the guard boat and the rest desperately reaching through the starters on port trying to get back round.

We made it back round and through eventually but seeing the look of confusion on the faces in the guard boat and hearing cries of protest we were surprised the race carried on. We did the whole of the first beat and the front runners had started the reach before the committee boat caught up with us to cancel the race following numerous protests from the fleet.

After the 4th attempt we finally got away, the wind had picked up a little so it was a good breeze for everyone, just very shifty. There were no broken boats from the days racing but a few broken dreams with Senior/White posting their two worst results (12th and 22nd), Burge/Childs recovering from 29th in Race 7 to win Race 8 and Craig/Lewis posting an 11th and 8th slipping them slightly out of contention for the top honours.

Going into the final day MacCarthy and Davis were looking like the ones to beat having demonstrated consistency in all conditions although Dobson/Tunnicliffe and Craig/Lewis were still in with a shout. In the end it was MacCarthy and Davis who took the title, halting the dominant winning reign of Dobson and

Tunnicliffe.

With the event done and dusted the closing ceremony and free flowing rum punch was a fitting finish to what had been memorable а event. Whilst the 2018 Mounts Bay Worlds unlikely to provide the same warm waters and blistering sunshine, it promises to build on the Barbados legacy and deliver a fantastic event.

Special mention must go to Duncan Greenhalgh, who entered his events for the year based on who he was crewing with and as such entered half in the Silver Fleet and half in the Bronze Fleet. This caused some controversy as Duncan finished fourth overall, nestled in with the Gold Fleet. However Duncan, with years of GP14 politics behind him as former president, opted out of all fleets and received a bottle of whiskey at the prize giving for a fantastic season and thanked his many crew: Colin Quint, Andy Wadsworth, David Lawson, Dave Allen and Peter Collins.

GP14 National Championships

Pwllheli Sailing Club ~ 21-26 August 2016

With the Barbados Worlds still ever present in memories it was with high hopes of sun tans and turtles that the GP14 fleet gathered in Wales for the 2016 GP14 National Championships. Instead we had to make do with sea weed, spray and grey skies.

Part of the Craftinsure Super 6, the entry of 36 and 4 cruisers duly rigged and started the long trek to the sand for Race 1 of the event which promised 22 knots and big waves.

New pairing of Fergus Barnham and Ellie Devereux (Northampton SC /Budworth SC) announced their arrival on the circuit rounding the windward mark in front of current world champions Shane MacCarthy and Andy Thompson (Greystones SC). The Greystones pair eventually took the lead and won the race with Fergus and Ellie second.

Sam Watson and Andy Hunter (Nantwich SC) lost third place after a wide line at the leeward mark allowed Nick Devereux and Geoff Edwards (Budworth SC) to sneak in the inside and were later disqualified by the protest committee.



The Race Officer's scouting trip first thing on Day 2 revealed a variability of 10 knots between the average wind strength and the gusts and the swell bigger than the day before. With the postponement called there was nothing to do but wait until the afternoon when we were cleared to go.

As we lined up for the first race of the day, Race 2, the wind was about 20 knots. The start was clean for most but Sam and Andy went for a gap that took them over and in an

effort to bear down on the boat below managing to get entangled and capsize. Right seemed to be the favoured way up the beat with yesterday's winners Shane and Andy looking dominant again but Mike and Liz Senior (South Staffs SC) and Nick and Geoff losing out after finding themselves OCS.

With the wind dropping race 3 got away cleanly and it was the turn of another Irish pair to take control with Alan Blay and David Johnstone (Sutton SC) leading the pack round windward closely followed by Shane and Andy, Mike and Liz and Fergus and Ellie.

Champagne racing was the promise for Day 3 (Races 4 and 5) but as we set off for the scheduled start it was more like weak orange squash with a postponement due to lack of wind. Eventually out, Race 4 took three attempts due to the tide and four boats found themselves OCS. With the wind now around 7 knots it looked set to favour some of the lighter pairings with Mike and Liz winning and Sam and Andy second. Shane and Andy won Race 5, Fergus and Ellie second and Mike and Liz third and reflecting the overall standings as of Day 3.



Day 4 (races 6 and 7) started with the wind ranging from 0 to 5 knots and our enthusiasm ranging from zero to 'shoot me now'. The line was port biased for the start of Race 6 which led to a massive gold fleet pile up on the pin end and a re-start. We were away on the second with Mike and Liz exploiting every none existent breath of wind to make it to the top of the beat first.

Second round was the silver fleet boat of Richard Ham and Vicky Ford (Tollesbury SC/South Staffs SC). The race pootled on with jellyfish moving faster than boats for the most part. On the final sausage leg Mike and Liz held onto the win but Richard and Vicky were unable to cling on to second, still finishing a very creditable fourth.

At this point the fleet thought Race 7 had been binned but the Race Officer had other ideas. Some struggled in the lack of wind but others profited. Frank Nickless and Ben Pickering (Chase SC/Dovey SC) took the lead initially but in perfect conditions for Mike and Liz it was looking like only a matter of time before they took the Chase pair which they did with the Bolton SC boys Gary Deighan and Dale Knowles taking third. Overnight leader Shane and Andy had a shocker and were fighting it out with Ann Penny and Lisa Carpenter (Derwent SC/South Staffs SC) in the middle of the fleet.

For the final day it looked like it was going to come down to the wind strength with Mike and Liz looking good for the win in light winds and Shane and Andy in heavy winds. As the boats headed out it became apparent that it was 20mph plus with waves up to 8 feet. This favoured Shane and Andy who took Race 8 with a commanding lead. As they crossed the line Gary and Dale were coming up in second. Playing it safe the Bolton boys thought they would drop the kite and then gybe for the tight reach into the finish rather than risk their second place 10 boat lengths from the finish. Unfortunately it sent them in anyway but as they had such a big gap on third it looked like they would still get over in time after the first time they got the boat back up. But alas it was too full of water and they went over two more times, eventually taking 11th. Overnight leaders Mike and Liz ended up doing turns on the last run and eventually took fourth.

For the final race of the event it was Shane and Andy's to lose but they finished in style with a win with Nick and Geoff second and Gary and Dale third. Elsewhere the eventual silver fleet winners had a port starboard incident with Shane and Andy and an



emergency tack with a cleated gib saw Frank and Ben over and out and final standing of 11th overall.

The overall top five shows once again the strength and diversity of the fleet with Liz Senior the top female crew with Mike in second, new to the class and top youngest combined age Fergus and Ellie third, great grandmaster Ian Willis and Keith Dutton (South Staffs SC) in fourth and Sam and Andy in fifth. A very well deserved win for Shane and Andy who are having quite a year in the GP14.

SOUTHERN AREA REPORT

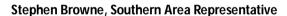
As I write this end of season report we just have our winter open at the Welsh Harp SC in London left, with two races and the 2016 travellers prize giving.

If you look at the results you will see Duncan had to call on a number of friends to crew for him across the open meetings and championships, and that takes some effort to keep looking for crews to keep the boat on the water, to keep competing and even more so to keep touring.

We've seen some big further reductions in the numbers travelling to open meetings and championships this year, with some of the champions seeing what you would consider open meeting numbers and open meetings down to club racing numbers, and the numbers qualifying for the Bell series are dropping to the point all the trophies can't be awarded. We see the same thing in club racing with troughs, troughs and peaks, and with my own club at West Kirby having a revival and some fantastic racing with over 15 boats out on a Thursday night, but this is half the number we used to have in the early noughties when the fleet had to be split into gold and silver.

It's hard to say, sales of new and second hand boats is steady, there's still a hard core group that take part in the championships, clubs are still willing host open meetings and the Association is still passionate about the class and supporting the development of sailors, the boat and the sails.

The dates for next year's Northern Bell series are starting to come in, and I hope everyone can take part in their own clubs event and if possible put the boat on the back of the car and take a trip to the clubs nearby. Open meetings that have a good turn out and good racing, attracts more boats, which attracts the good guys, which attracts the competition and the event grows.

Best wishes for the winter series, Merry Christmas, Happy New Year and I hope to see you on a piece of water near you in 2017.

MIDLANDS AREA REPORT 2016

This year's Midland Bell program was necessarily compressed due to the world Championships being held in Barbados, but despite this, early turnouts were good except for one event which unfortunately clashed with the Inlands. Pete Jacques, crewed by Hayley Ramadhar took an early lead in the series despite an uncharacteristic fourth place at Shustoke but followed by seconds at Chase and North Staffs and wins at Nantwich and Trimpley. The Staunton event was unusually held in July and was perhaps the windiest of the series so far, with a strangely low turnout of 7 boats, though it did clash with a number of top sporting events on the television, nevertheless those who did attend had a great sail in challenging conditions, the winners being local boys Pete Gray and Richard Pepperdine. The South Staffs event produced the expected high turnout (26 boats - 6 visitors) demonstrating their strength in depth in GP14 sailing. Mike Senior took the win with three bullets in very light wind conditions. As I write this, we have just returned from the Area Championships at Chelmarsh, where 22 boats from the far corners of England and Wales (i.e. we had entries from Kent, London, Cumbria, and Cardiff as well as the Midlands and North West) raced in light to very light winds with Andy Smith and Phil

So, as things stand, with one Midland Bell event left (Manor Park on 22nd October), Pete Jacques and Hayley Ramadhar have the series in the bag, the runners up being Matt Birks and Alan Jones, with third place still up for grabs. There are five series qualifiers at present and 4 more boats could qualify by sailing the final event – watch this space.

Hodgkins from Bassenthwaite winning the event with 3 firsts from the 4 races sailed.

Planning for next season has started and the Midland Area championships will be held at Staunton Harold on 8th/9th April 2017 – and it doesn't clash with Wimbledon or the British Grand Prix - get it in your diary! The rest of the Midland Bell dates will be settled at our Annual meeting in early November when we shall mull things over and consider what we can do differently or better in 2017. Details will be in the Spring edition of Mainsail.

I hope that as many of you as possible will keep sailing over the winter both at your clubs and maybe at some of the big winter Open events so that you are all fit and ready for next year to join us on this friendly circuit.

Finally, a big thank you to all the competitors and the clubs and their officers and volunteers for hosting events in the Midlands, running the races, the safety boats and galleys and keeping the events running.

CLASSIC AND VINTAGE BOYS GO WINDJAMMING ON WINDERMERE



This year the fleet for the End of Season Championships included not only one brand spanking new plastic boat, (I watched the lads carefully unwrapping it in the boat park), but also no 28, Stewart Elder's lovely example of an original Series One Bell Woodworking boat, complete with wooden spars and brass fittings. It was great to be able to see such a demonstrable contrast and to appreciate the way in which the boat has been developed without compromising its fundamental attributes.

I took along 4615 which, as many will know by now, has been extensively rebuilt to bring it up to the most recent incarnation of the Series One wooden boat, having also started life (in kit form) at Bell Woodworking. Again it was good to see the interest this generated among people as they witnessed the metamorphosis of the class.

So how did we both perform on the water I hear you ask? Well the first thing to say is that we both really enjoyed ourselves and want to say a big thank-you to Gill and her

team for organising it! The boats actually went remarkably well: we all started as one fleet and Stewart was by no means off the pace at the tail, finishing every race in close touch with the back markers and occasionally in front of them! We had our moments too, the first beat in race 2 resulting in one of our best ever positions at a windward mark, rounding in about 7th place out of a fleet of 35! The trouble is that the old ticker was going flat out and concentration became impaired by anxiety and we gradually slipped back to our natural home, within hailing distance of Stewart. Then in race 3 I threw the spinnaker pole over the side and by the time Phil and I found and collected it, Stewart was upon us!

It was the up-wind performance of the two boats that displayed the greatest disparity: my modifications have allowed me to use modern levels of rig tension and it was interesting to see how very much higher we were able to point than Stewart. Off wind

the boat speeds were remarkably close, Stewart was sailing single-handed so his all-up weight was probably less that our boat with two fat lads in it but even so, I thought that the fleet would clear off and leave him as a lonely speck on the horizon. No way, no28 came creaming down the reaches and runs like the true thoroughbred she is!

Verdict: a great weekend, we really must try to encourage some more of you Series One folk to come and join in the fun next year. If we can get a few of us together I am minded to ask for our own start and make ours a pursuit race, with the oldest and most original boat as the rabbit (Gareth, get those cottons ironed!).

PRESIDENTS REPORT 2016

AGM 2015 was held at Greystones Sailing Club who hosted the 2015 Youth Championship of Ireland. Thanks to the hard work of Norman & Una Lee and the organising committee of Greystones. The Youth Championship attracted 24 Youths helms from across the country and was widely recognised as an excellent event with Sarah Byrne of the Irish Sailing Association commenting that is was the best event she had attended all year. Jack Curtin sailing with Tim Corcoran of Sligo lifted the Youth Championship with Shane MacCarthy and Damien Bracken dominating the Autumn Open by large margins on the water in some races - a sign of things to come.

After Greystones the final event of 2015 was the Hot Toddy hosted by Mullingar sailing Club. Mullingar has proved a popular venue for the Hot Toddy in recent years with 2015 proving no different. The event attracted 28 entries with Shane MacCarthy and Damien Bracken eyeing a clean sweep of events. However Ger Owens and Melanie Morris had different designs and won four of the six races to score a comprehensive win. By all accounts a highly enjoyable event with Mullingar Sailing Club providing exceptional hospitality throughout. The sailors enjoyed tea and scones ashore while watching the Springboks and Wales contest the Rugby World Cup semi-final before retiring to Danny Byrnes pub to watch New Zealand win over France in the final.

The 2016 season started in April with an excellent World Championship win in Barbados for our own Shane MacCarthy sailing with Andy Davis of the UK. 105 GP's contested the largest overseas World Championship in the classes' history. 23 Irish boats travelled to Barbados for the event with Shane & Andy prevailing over a star studded field which included reigning five time GP14 World Champions Ian Dobson & Andy Tunnicliffe, former World Champion Neil Marsden, former UK National Champion Mike Senior and multi class World and European Champion Nick Craig sailing with Toby Lewis and widely recognised as Britain's most successful amateur sailor. An excellent result for Irish sailing and for the GP14 class in particular. Well done Shane & Andy.

With the boats retuning from Barbados in late April and without wanting to lose an event, the Class decided to utilise the **Purcell Trophy**, raced on Saturday as part of the qualifiers for that unique event the **Riocaird O'Tiarnaigh Trophy** which concluded Sunday. Shane MacCarthy continued his dominance and sailing with regular crew Damien Bracken won both the Purcell and O'Tiarnaigh Challenge. At the prize giving GP14 Ireland President Stephen Boyle on behalf of the class presented Shane with a replica Worlds Trophy to serve as a permanent reminder of his fantastic achievement in Barbados. Thanks to organiser and PRO Peter Smyth and his crew in Swords Sailing and Boating Club, they pulled it off despite the tropical sunshine mingled and sprinkled with tropical downpours.

The members of East Down Yacht Club in Strangford Lough welcomed the GP14 fleet back for the 2016 Ulster Championships on the 25th and 26th June with their enthusiastic and warm hospitality. This was the fleet's first return to EDYC since the Club hosted the successful World Championships in 2014. Shane McCarthy and Damian Bracken put in a devastating performance with three convincing wins followed by the McGuinness brothers with three second places. The thirds were shared equally between Curly Morris and Laura McFarland, Keith Louden and Alan Thompson and the Gallagher brothers. Finally an impressive new trophy to mark the achievements of ace crew Andy Thompson from Larne was presented for the first time to winning crew, Damian Bracken. Andy has, over the years, notched up title after title in the GP14 and other classes and it is fitting that the GP class in Ireland recognise his unparalleled achievements. Well done Andy.

Sutton Dinghy Club hosted a combined Leinster Championships and Mirror National Championships with the Mirror Nationals Sailed over the Friday, Saturday & Sunday and the Leinsters in their usual two day six race format. It was fitting that the class should be sharing this event with the Mirror Nationals as many of the current GP14 sailors began their sailing careers in this class and indeed the current GP14 fleet boasts more than its fair share of past Mirror National Champions. With 3 Olympians and a World Champion in the GP14 Leinster Fleet that weekend in Sutton, the Mirror sailors and their parents were seriously interested in the events progress. In an event full of twist & turns, conditions to severely test, Scorie Walls and her team coped admirably with the GP14 and Mirror fleets and Sutton provided superb racing for competitors from

all over the country. Thanks to Sutton Dinghy Club for their exceptional hospitality and for organising an event to remember. Winners were Shane MacCarthy & Damien Bracken with Katie Dwyer and Michelle Rowley first in Silver and Peter Boyle top Youth Helm.

Five Irish boats travelled to the UK Nationals held in the Welsh National sailing academy Plas Heli in Pwllheli Wales in the week immediately preceding the Championship of Ireland in Skerries. A fantastic weeks sailing served as the perfect tune up for the Irish Championship and those who travelled thoroughly enjoyed a mix of top class racing and social. At the AGM Curly Morris was elected Vice President of the International Association as Ann Penny assumed the hot seat from outgoing President Duncan Greenhalgh. It was notable that a large UK youth contingent sailed in the event and it was great to see our own youths forming strong bonds and friendships with these sailors. This is something we should encourage as a class going forward.

The Irish Championship in Skerries saw the fleet restored to full strength with 38 boats including three UK entries encouraged over in response. As ever Skerries Sailing Club excelled in providing top class racing in a very popular venue for the class. I was delighted to receive their offer of hosting the World Championships 2020 as we had outstanding Worlds at Skerries in 1997.

One of the initiatives the committee is undertaking is to collect information on the history of the GP14 Class in Ireland and in order to launch this program invitations were sent to a number of former members to attend Skerries on the Saturday and bring along any photos of memorabilia they may have. I'm happy to report that the original minute books from 1957 have been located and should greatly assist with this initiative. The program will continue with a number of regional meetings to be scheduled over the coming year.

Skerries also hosted our Youth Training event supported by the Howard Davies Memorial Fund, EXE Sails and the ISA in the two days immediately preceding the Championship of Ireland. 18 youth sailors participated and the association gained 10 new youth members in the process. Thanks to Colman Grimes for his hard work in organising this very successful event. Coleman is also responsible for the resurgence in interest in the GP from Rush Sailing Club.

I would like to thank Norman Lee who is stepping down after number of years on committee. Norman brought passion to his role and was primarily responsible for nurturing the fleet in Yoghal and encouraging them to participate in regional competitions. He was also instrumental in forcing change in the ISA and demanding that the Irish sailing authority refocus on grass roots sailing in support of the dinghy classes and away from the large boat focus which they assumed in recent years. Melanie Morris is also stepping down to focus on family matters. Congratulations to Melanie on the birth of her daughter and many thanks for getting control of the Association trophies by instituting a Trophy Register with photograph of all trophies currently in circulation.

I'd also like to thank all of those who gave their time both on and off committee to the class during the year; Shane MacCarthy for PR, Laura McFarland who is an excellent Secretary and keeps the website updated with the latest event details and news, Michael Collender who keeps us on track financially, Ossian Geraghty who organises the calendar each year and Andy Johnston is assisting with the initiative to document the class history as well as being very active on the Twitter and Facebook and with photography and event reports.

2017 will see the Leinster Championships return to the Volvo Dun Laoghaire Regatta as a three day championships (7-9th July 2017) after a very successful outing there in 2015. This event is hosted by the big four Dun Laoghaire waterfront clubs and includes a full social program which attracted over 400 boats and 3000 sailors in 2015. Ferry deals will be available to accommodate overseas visitors but you will need to book early to avoid the late entry fee. Full details will be available at www.dlregatta.org and via the GP Ireland website.
