President's Piece

The pace of change in our pandemic situation is almost breath taking. Many of us are, or have been recently, living with "lockdown" measures to control the spread of the virus and reduce the COVID related deaths which accompany increased infections. However, November has also seen the announcement of no less than three apparently highly

effective vaccines, produced at unprecedented speed by the application of impressive scientific methodology.

While a roll-out of the vaccine may well commence before the end of 2020, I believe this will start with the most vulnerable and their carers, before rolling out to the very elderly and health care workers. The logistics of vaccinating whole populations are challenging. My own opinion is that it may well be the summer before most of the people who sail GP14s can be offered a vaccine, and we return to more normal living conditions.

With this in mind your committee has taken three decisions. In conjunction with Skerries Sailing Club we have now postponed the 2020 World Championship to 2022. We believe that this will allow sailors to book ferries and accommodation with confidence and sponsors to feel assured the event will attract the entry we would all hope to see. We appreciate we will now have to review International events beyond 2022.

Secondly, as indicated in the November newsletter, we have cancelled the proposed British Nationals at Brixham. We have had useful and friendly discussions with the officials of Brixham YC, and during the course of those discussions it became apparent that local businesses believe that 2021 will be a "staycation" year, making weekend accommodation bookings (especially last minute ones) difficult. COVID regulations which might still be in place were making the event expensive and there was no guarantee of any social events. Finally, with school (and possibly university) exams being held later than usual we might effectively exclude this part of our entry. We nevertheless hope to return to Brixham at some time in the future.

With these two decisions in mind the Committee believes that 2021 will be a "big" year for local sailing. Even with restrictions, many Clubs saw record turnouts in August and September this year. We expect next year will be similar and therefore in the UK will be focusing on our regional events which can easily be called off at short notice and our class events such as inlands, youths and masters. In Ireland, where the chances of running an Irish championship are more realistic, we will focus on our regional events.

I appreciate that in some places such as Australia, where the sun may be shining brightly, measures to control COVID have been more successful and a normal sailing programme may well be possible. Enjoy - those of us in the Northern hemisphere will be especially envious this year!

Finally as the (not so) festive season approaches I urge you all to stay safe, in the expectation that before another year passes we will be able to sail and socialise together as we did before. For those able to get afloat, make the most of your opportunity. To all of you I wish you season's greetings with the hope we will all be able to meet and compete in 2021.

HAV HOLDEN (Tony or Ant to his friends) of Combs Sailing Club). Just as the Spring Edition of Mainsail was published, we heard, with great sadness, of the death on 29th February 2020 of HAV Holden a Life Member of the class.

Tony was a stalwart of the GP14 Northern sailing scene in the 60s and 70s. His family were friendly with Searson Thompson at Bell Woodworking who supplied his first dinghy with which he enjoyed great success at his home Club, Combs S C, before moving on to his second GP, Sail No:5555 built by RR Sills.

He honed his sailing skills at Combs with the likes of Ricky Lord (a past National Champion), David Smith (previous GP Association Northern Area Rep), Chris and Andrew Howard and

Paul Bowmer (Current Treasurer). He expanded his sailing expertise firstly in the Northern Area GP scene at Clubs like Burwain, Budworth, Hollingworth Lake and Bolton, and further north at Windermere and Bassenthwaite at their open meetings as well as in team racing fixtures with some of these clubs. He then progressed to the Area Championships and the Nationals where he was a consistently high finisher. He won the NE Area National Championships in 1971 in his new green boat "Hot Yot," Sail number 9666. You could also be sure to see him (and sometimes his boat as well) competing in the annual Southport 24 Hour Race from the date of its establishment. The Combs team finished 3rd in 1972 in the GP Class.

Tony was also instrumental in setting up the Northern Bell racing series, the first traveller series for the class, and he commissioned and arranged funding for the original Northern Bell Travellers Trophy. Other regions followed this lead with their

own "Bell" traveller series which continue to this day. He also was a keen supporter of the annual Menai Straits Regatta held on Anglesey, spending his annual fortnight's holiday there with his wife Barbara, crew Pip Henson and three children, Louise, Tim and Charles.

VALERIE RICKERBY died at the great age of 95. She had a life-long love of sailing which started when she was a young married woman called Valerie Banner-Mendus. Her husband leuan and she, along with his brother Elwyn and his wife Enid (plus Joan and Basil Lloyd and the Hatricks) together founded Bassenthwaite Sailing Club in the lakes which continues to thrive to this day. There is still a challenge cup in my father's name. He died



prematurely in 1958, though they did go to the national Championships on the south coast before I was born I think. I know that my mother won something at Llandudno at the national Championships in the late 60's - it may have been the women's competition. She was a very competitive person and named her last boat 'Circe', who in Greek myth turned all men into swine - which is what she thought happened to them when they got in a boat to race!

I have quite a lot of photos of her sailing on the lake from the 50's and 60's. Their first boat was called 'Lawless' (my father was a solicitor, so more humour about boats and behaviour there I think). The sail number was 197 - which must make it quite an early model I presume?

She worked as a journalist for the Whitehaven News during her years as a single parent and had a piece published in the Guardian in the 60's about a day's sailing trip with my brother and myself down to the end of Bass Lake and back. In later years she re-married and started to sail the West Coast of Scotland - but not in GP's ! When her second husband died she continued every year for the next 30 to sail the Western isles with her old friends from her sailing days at Bassenthwaite.

She managed to avoid the pandemic, for which I am grateful. Sailing was her great love and featured musically at her funeral. Despite her advanced years she remained of a lively mind and kept her connection to the origins of her passion, at least in part, through your magazine.

My name is Christopher Godber and I am the eldest son of Geoffrey Godber the Founder of the Shropshire Sailing Club.

When my Father called a Public Meeting in Shrewsbury in October 1950 it was resolved to form the Shropshire Sailing Club and established the Club on a site at Whitemere. Very shortly after the initial meeting the Committee adopted the Firefly and the GP as SSC Club classes. Members were invited to join Groups that were definitely interested in purchasing Boats. Eight Members signed up to buy Firefly's. Twelve Members signed up to buy GP's. It was left to Geoffrey Godber to negotiate the deals with the Manufacturers.

Geoffrey visited Dusty Pollock at Bell Woodworking and a deal was struck at a discounted price for the 12 GP's to be fully manufactured and supplied complete with sails. As you correctly state in your Forum the Sailing Club at Aberdovey had adopted the GP Class and Geoffrey was advised that they had been allocated Numbers 1 to 12. Therefore SSC was the second Club to adopt the GP and numbers 13 to 24 inclusive were allocated to their boats. My recollection is that all the GP's arrived at SSC in either May or June 1951.

When the GP's arrived the numbers were on the Sails but there was no BELL symbol on the Sails. So this suggests that the Aberdovey Boats had the Bell symbol put on the sail by request of the Club. As you have correctly stated the Bell issue was resolved at the GP Association Meeting held in Shrewsbury in November 1951.



My Father always maintained that the driving force behind the founding of the GP Association was Dr John Ryle and that the first meeting was held in his house in Shrewsbury. John Ryle owned a GP and was one the SSC group of 12 purchasers of GP's. To prove my story here is a photograph GP 14 at SSC at Whitemere with sails up and no Bell symbol!

THE FESTIVAL OF BRITAIN STORY

The Bell Woodworking Company had a stand at THE FESTIVAL OF BRITAIN in London in 1951. During the course of the Summer of 1951 while The Festival was in progress they built a GP14 on their stand a Shropshire Sailing Club Member Humphrey Morris who had joined the Club too late to be part of the 12 boat GP purchase did a deal with Dusty Pollock to buy the Festival of Britain GP and he arranged for it to be transported to SSC at Whitemere. Humphrey called the boat South Bank and as there were no numbers on Sails he put Number 7 on the sail. This of course clashed with an Aberdovey GP Number 7 so this anomaly had to be sorted out when the GP Class was formed and a Boat number register established. I think Humphrey Morris was allocated something like 177 and he was not happy.

THE FIRST GP NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS - OCTOBER 1952



Geoffrey Godber acted as Officer of the Day at the first GP National Championships held at The Shropshire Sailing Club. I cannot recall the winner but in second place was SSC Member

Janet Fenn-Wiggin sailing a GP called Madame X for Fred Williams an SSC Member who owned the boat. The GP Association were so pleased with the resulting Championships they asked Geoffrey Godber to help them run the 1953 Championships.

CRUISING: Cruising Corner

For very obvious reasons in this exceptional "COVID" year the organised cruising programme, like much else, has been a casualty. However I have been delighted to hear from a modest number of owners during the year that they have nonetheless been able to get a little sailing, albeit somewhat limited, and I myself did manage one day with my godson in *A Capella*, my erstwhile highly bespoke modern cruising GP which I passed on to him about three years ago.

Meanwhile your Cruising Rep has been "sailing a desk" for much of the year, and this has included a lot of support by way of correspondence with Members, ranging from cruising to vintage boats to repair and maintenance, etc.

COVID permitting, for 2021 we are currently planning at least the two events postponed from this present year.

Unfortunately the knock-on effect of the pandemic presents me with a personal problem of my availability next year, because my examining commitments are as yet unknown. We know that at least some UK exams are to be postponed, with the International papers which I more usually mark still an unknown situation, and even for the UK we have absolutely no firm information on dates as yet. So I don't know what part of next summer I will be tied to a desk, and probably won't know for many months yet. I am therefore planning on the basis of what I hope I will be able to manage, but I am also trying to build in some contingency plans.



Other Events

We did have offers over 18 months ago from a member prepared to organise a cruising event at Llyn Tegid (a.k.a. Bala Lake), and likewise from a member in North Brittany offering to organise one there. However despite flagging these up at the time, both in Mainsail and on the

website, and asking for indications of interest, there was nil response to both; and then COVID intervened anyway.

However if there are expressions of interest from Members (but not otherwise) I shall sound out whether these might still be available for 2021, and if they are



indeed still available we will then publicise them electronically. So please let us know, ASAP, if you are potentially interested!

CRUISING: Cruiser Week

COVID permitting, we will be hosted by Restronguet Sailing Club, where Richard Moore, my oldest sailing friend and an erstwhile GP14 sailor who is also very well known within the GP14 cruising circle, is Rear Commodore. The location is on the Fal estuary, in West Cornwall, which is a superbly scenic cruising area, and deservedly popular. It also makes for a family-friendly holiday, with plenty of other attractions in the area as well as the sailing.

Dates Wednesday to **Wednesday 21 – 28 July**, i.e. arriving afternoon or evening of 21st and departing morning of 28th, with actual sailing Thursday to Tuesday, and with the possibility of a lay day if people so wish. The mid-week travel is in order to avoid the potential nightmare of travelling on a Saturday in the peak holiday season.

The costings have not yet been decided, but 2020's costings should be a good guide, and then allow for a slight increase. The biggest cost is the safety boat, with the secondary item being temporary membership. On the 2020 figures, if we had had 5 participating dinghies and used RIB support throughout that would have worked out at £170 per boat, inclusive of temporary family membership, for 5 sailing days (plus one lay day) in the week. It would have been slightly cheaper for single-handers, and significantly cheaper if we used either Richard's Cornish Shrimper or my Privateer 20 as a safety boat rather than a RIB; but both are slightly slower than a GP14 to windward in brisk conditions, and well below GP planing speeds, so not ideal.

That is admittedly more expensive than some past Cruising Weeks, but after adjusting for inflation it is very comparable with the cost of previous events in Poole or Abersoch, for example, and is not vastly above the cost for Brixham. I am sure that it also compares very well indeed with the cost of a full week's racing event.

It will be significantly cheaper if we have more boats, of course, since the cost of the RIB is fixed and is to be divided by the number of boats.

CRUISING: Cruiser Training

Following the success of may have been our first ever Advanced Cruiser Training Course last September, on the non-tidal Graffham Water, a second iteration was to have been held in 2020 on the intensely tidal waters of the Mersey, hosted by Liverpool Sailing Club. Again COVID permitting, this is now in the process of being re-arranged for 2021, provisionally Friday 16 - Sunday 18 July, to include a downriver day-cruise; in the event of my examining commitments ruling out the preferred dates, the reserve dates are Friday 24 - Sunday 26 September, to include an upriver day-cruise.

This is very specifically an Advanced course, designed to equip participants with the skills to plan and carry out independent day-cruises, in which you may often be the only boat on the water; and to do so safely and enjoyably. Importantly that includes being able to cope with adverse weather if caught out despite all your care in checking the forecasts; gale force 7/8 on a benign forecast of only force 3 has occasionally been known to occur (more than once and the occasion when I experienced it was exacerbated by our being off a major headland), and if that happens one needs to be able to handle it. I can confirm that a GP14 will indeed cope with such conditions, provided you have the relevant skills to safely and effectively reef the boat at sea, and the boat is suitably set up for it.

The course borrows a certain amount from RYA Yachtmaster, albeit tailored specifically to dinghies, plus a certain amount from the Dinghy Cruising Association, and also from many decades of experience.

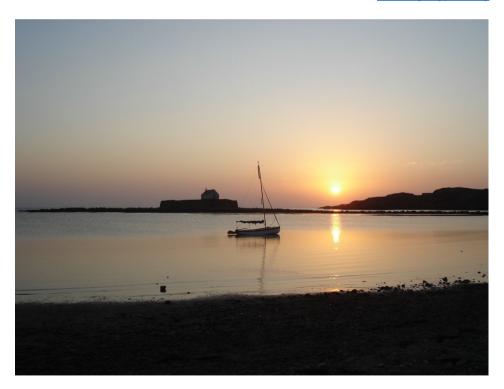
Of course it will, as a by-product, also equip participants for the much less demanding cruising skills needed for cruising in an organised fleet event, since those who have the skills to cruise independently can take our sort of organised cruising events in their stride.

Expect the course to be fairly intensive, and to include reefing systems (and much practice in using them), masthead buoyancy, alternative propulsion, communications systems, MOB recovery, tiller brakes (etc.), tide predictions, charts, keeping up the position, passage planning, Colregs (a.k.a. "rule of the road"), use of transits, anchoring, mooring, heaving-to, lee shores, and much else.

Technical: GP14 Self Build

The internal fit out

Started January and completed end of June. This involved a good deal of thought regarding measuring once, twice and once more just to make sure. Also involves quite a bit of dry fitting (once again just to make sure, if you've not done it before)

Forward deck beam, king plank and stringers all glued in ready for cleaning off to take forward deck.





Rear deck beam, king plank and stringers ready for fixing. Notice the side tank panels not yet fixed as easier to work out position of rear curved beam and then cut slots in side tank panels. Slots need to be neat as these are the rear buoyancy tanks. Care is also taken to ensure all regulations are adhered to regards deck widths and depths.



The Plate case top, thwart and seat positions all need working and setting out beforehand as they are all interlinked. Also, the mainsheet post needs forming and fixing before the plate case top is fixed into position.



The Thwart curves down at the bench ends. This gives support to the side-benches midway. I must say this takes some working out with patience needed.





The thwart ends are fixed to the side tank panels via beveled and slotted Maple blocks. Forming items like this gave me much pleasure.

It was decided to take advantage of the new rule that came out earlier this year that allows the spinnaker to be stored through the decks. All measurements kindly supplied by Phil Hodgkins of Ginger Boats. These were used in conjunction with the rules about widths of side decks etc.

Forming and fixing the coamings around the mast chock was an interesting job involving laminating maple blocks to obtain depth of timber. Then routing and boring to form two curved sections. I cut a few spares, just in case!! Inner coaming support and one piece outer rubbing bead support have been sourced fairly locally and once these are all in position the 4mm deck panels can be sorted and rough cut ready for gluing.



Thankfully Phil had sent me two 4mm sheet for the decks that were mirror images of one another, the grain was of matching flower (joinery term). This gives a very pleasing look, helping to make the dinghy attractive.

Fore, rear and side decks are all mirrored.





Once the decks are fixed it's time to source the inner coaming material. Maple is probably best here as it's quite dense but, I'd used ripple sycamore for a table a couple of years earlier and liked the effect of the grain. This I managed to source at the end of an 8hr return drive to Ipswich and in the process pick up a session on a driver training course.

This sycamore was used on all inner coamings except for the pieces around the mast chock. Maple was used here.

The outer rubbing strips were single length pieces and I manage to attach these without temporary screwing them to their supports.









With all timber edges sweetened (rounded off) and necessary holes bored the process of cleaning up (sanding) begins and continues as I contemplate taking my three 2 year old grandchildren for gentle rows on the sheltered waters of the Solent next summer. Also thinking about paint and varnish coats as I'm told that finishing the hull and topsides can cost up to £4000 if done by a professional, so me thinks I need to invest in some rollers and tipping off brushes.

If anyone is thinking of venturing down the route of a self-build then I would be willing to help provide information and photo's once you've sourced a kit from a supplier. I think the work involved is within most people's grasp as long as you have some proficiency with wood cutting

tools. Don't forget measure twice, cut once lol.

f the virus in the

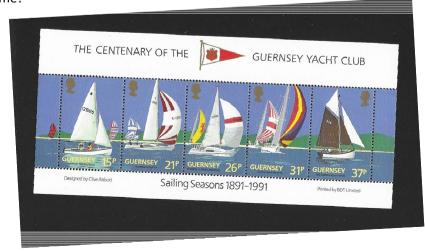
community and no living restrictions.

Editor: Shortly after the above went out in the E-newsletter I had an interesting email from **Graham Knox** as follows:

I enjoyed reading about sailing in Guernsey. Back in 1991, a GP14 was featured in a set of stamps issued to celebrate the centenary of the Yacht Club. It was my predecessor as Secretary (Peter Sandbach) who alerted me to this as an occasional stamp collector. I did get two of this special souvenir issue so if there was anyone with real interest, I might agree for one set to go to another good home!



What did you do in the lock-down Grandad?

Like everybody this year I have been on the look-out for projects around the

home to keep me from going mad, or more to the point to prevent me from driving Liz mad! One such was the decluttering of the attic room, that had become a comprehensive dumping ground over the past 35 years for all the



surplus family clutter. And it was there I rediscovered, hidden and forgotten under the model railway benching, the sad remains of a model yacht that I acquired some 55 years ago. Another boat to restore, yippee!

The model was passed on to me as a schoolboy by family friends who knew that I was mad keen on sailing and they in turn had received it from an ancient relative (if my memory is correct), who built the boat in his youth. I therefore recon that she dates to around 1890. Unfortunately the model had already suffered severe neglect by the time it reached me and my own efforts to bring it back to life were amateurish to say the least.

Having successfully avoided the skip for so many years, now seemed like the ideal time to give the boat a full make-over. She is intended to be a yawl and the hull (the only original part) is about two feet long and beautifully carved from Douglas fir or similar. Having no other information about the class of boat she is



intended to replicate, other than knowing that the maker almost certainly lived on the Sussex coast, I took a look on the internet for inspiration. There I found loads of information about the yawl 'Germaine', a superb gaff rigged racing yawl, built in 1882 by Camper and Nicholson and restored from a total wreck some 8 years ago. Length and beam scaled down to match my model almost exactly and the two boats certainly

looked very similar, so I decided that my builder could well have based his model on Germaine and I would therefore do the same.

Stripping the paint from the hull revealed all the past efforts at repair: the stem had been bodged with balsa wood (by me) and the stern counter had been remade with pieces of pine and loads of putty (well before my time). A large shrinkage crack had also opened up on the starboard side amidships. Fortunately the Hugh Brazier school of boat repair has taught me well and remedial work was soon underway, using well-seasoned Douglas fir from my stock of 'wood that is too good to throw away', (it annoys the hell out of Liz!). The stern counter was modified slightly to give the boat a mahogany transom to match that of Germaine and a new and heavier keel was made from iron and lead, quite a challenge but I think it should do the job and it looks something like the real thing.

With the basic work done, I turned to the fun stuff of replicating Germaine's deck layout and fittings as well as her spars. With the help of the internet and our local classic model yacht club and a great deal of patience I eventually produced what I think is an 'okay' result. It was good enough to persuade Liz to join the project team and produce some great looking sails anyway!

So now baby Germaine is finished and waiting to be sailed. I am not expecting



her to be that successful on the water as I wanted the rigging and sails to look like the real boat and where model vachts are concerned, it seems that such things have to be very different if they are to perform properly. But hey ho, it has given me hours pleasure in these COVID-cursed times, and I never intended to buy the anorak anyway!

Started Sailing:

In 1987 we joined South Staffs Sailing Club essentially for the boys to learn how to sail. However, the following year I decided to enroll in the Learn to Sail course at the Club and was immediately hooked. Chris had no interest as he was well into Motorsport, owning a Rally car and taking part in many forest stage events.

First Boat:

"Rubber Duck" 8524. It turned out to be a very good wooden boat and we kept it for 5 years. It became a well-loved boat within the Club and changed hands several times over the years within the Club with everyone having fond memories of it. It had huge sums of money spent on it. About 10 years ago we organised a "Rubber Duck party" and everyone who had owned it was invited and asked to bring with them all the invoices.
